# February's Big Game

Toward the middle of January the air seems to change, and it has nothing to do with the weather. As the National Football League continues toward the final games of the season, fans discuss who will go to the Big Game. People begin planning Big Game watch parties, businesses prep for crowds, grocery store aisles sell out, and tickets become non-existent.

The Big Game began in 1967 with the Kansas City Chiefs playing the Green Bay Packers in Los Angeles. The game went off without a hitch, but did not have a full crowd. The popularity of the Big Game would not arrive until years later. The Green Bay Packers won the first Big Game and even went on to win the next year too.

Today the Big Game is televised around the world. You do not need a ticket to watch this national pastime. However with ticket prices starting at \$3,000 and up, you do need a padded wallet. Many tickets sell for over \$20,000. Fans come out in their team gear, tailgate prior to the game, and wait in anticipation for the musical halftime show. The Big Game has definitely become a national pastime, stopping America and other parts of the world for one night each year.

# **DISCUSSION QUESTIONS**

1). Why do you think the league decided to have an official playoff game?

Student answers may vary depending on past knowledge. The National Football League wanted to have a final game that would end the season and give a final winner. This game would merge the National Football League and American Football League as one. This would help both leagues not compete for fans.

2). Why do you think fans initially didn't want to watch or purchase tickets for the first Big Game?

Student answers may vary depending on past experiences. During the first game, tickets sold for about \$12. In 1967 this price was not cheap but fans also had to travel to Los Angeles to see the game. So if you didn't have money for travel, you watched the game on television.

3). Why do you think companies spend so much money on ads during the Big Game?

Student answers may vary depending on experiences. The first game charged about \$40,000 for a 30-second spot. This number has continued to go up as popularity grows. Millions of consumers watch the game so companies spend a lot of money to gain a small bit of time.

4). At the beginning of the game they toss a coin to determine who begins the game. Game officials once held this right, now it is given to someone to honor them. Who would you choose to complete the coin toss at the beginning of the game?

Student answers may vary depending on experiences. Any answer would be good as long as the student can back up their opinions.

5). The halftime show has continued to gain popularity, many years surpassing viewing numbers compared to the game itself. Who would you choose to be a part of the halftime show?
